Fishing Report

Special Crappie Report ...

Wow! The best way to describe crappie fishing is ... well really there isn't any way to really describe it other than it's the best I've ever seen it. My clients and I are catching huge numbers of fish. However,

while you still have to be patient and work thru a fair number of non-keepers, but by the end of the day our catch usually includes a lot of nice ones. **White Crappie** ... are most definitely in transition to the spawning areas. Some mid-bay brush piles that once held huge schools of fish two days ago now look like a vacant parking lot while other brush piles are absolutely loaded with fish. My **Lowrance HDS** showed huge numbers of white crappie located in the creels channels making their way to the spawning grounds (*See Sonar Tip of the Week*). In four trips this week we caught and released an insane number of white crappie that were ever so slightly

under the legal size requirement. I mention this because there has been great concern with the lack of white crappie caught over the past two seasons. With what I'm seeing the white crappie population has rebounded with a vengeance. The best results came by backing off submerged structure and casting 3/32 oz. Kentucky Green Curly Tails around the cover.



Crappie fishermen, tired of getting hung up? Try Light Wire hooks on your lead heads and curly tails!

Master lure designer Ken McGregor at *the Fisherman's Friend in Lake City (270)362-4323* is at it again. A couple of weeks ago I complained to Ken and Barb about getting hung up too much in brush when my clients and I were fishing for crappie. Having to retire after breakoffs is part of fishing but there is always a better way. Nobody knows more about making lures better than Ken so he made me a bunch of lead heads with light wire hooks. I must admit I am more than pleasantly pleased ... I'm surprised at how well the lead heads work. The light wire looks allow us to fish around the heaviest cover and if we get hung up, a steady pull of the line will bend the hook and dislodge the lure. We've gotten so effective at dislodging the lure that my clients have no fear of getting hung up and sometimes we even catch a crappie as the lure comes free. Using Power Pro braided line in 10lb test (2 lb. diameter) and a matching

fluorocarbon leader rounds out the system. Add your favorite curly tail or tube jig and you're ready to get in the game. The Light Wire lead heads come in assorted sizes and colors.

Special Note to all you Crappie Fishermen ... Based on what I've seen the last several months and culminating with what has happened the past 10 days, if you want to crappie fish with a Guide this fall you better book NOW! With the phenomenal amount of 9 1/2 - 9 3/4 inch fish we've caught, come fall it promises to be the best crappie fishing ever!

Smallmouth Bass ... this week we caught a large number of smaller male bass on the spawning flats on Jerk Baits and Steel Shad Blade Baits. Also we dueled with a couple big females this week that have gotten the better of us by tossing our baits back at us with one in particular landing a Shakey Head in my lap. Some of the larger females are already coming off the bed.

Largemouth Bass ... on the move and being caught shallow on main lake points, gravel banks and on the deeper flats at the mouth of the bays. Best baits are ZMan finesse worms on a 3/16 oz PJ's bass extractor jig, Steel Shad blade baits, spinner baits, lipless and square bill crankbaits and A-rigs. With the bass moving shallower over the last few days no doubt you'll be able to catch them on your favorite baits and techniques. Look for the bays with the warmest water and pay special attention to the shallow drop or ledge adjacent to deeper water. With the full moon fast approaching on April 5th, look for Largemouth to be in full spawn mode by then. *(Photo) Kick'n Bass with a couple of good ones caught shallow slow rolling a white spinner bait.*

As I mentioned earlier in the report we had been catching boat loads of crappie over submerged brush 12-15 feet deep. Once the migration to the spawning flats began some of the submerged cover that once held fish became fishless. Experience has shown once this happens, crappie travel the creek channels closest to the spawning flats. The screen shows a massive school of crappie in transition. We used our HDS 10 to locate the school and marked their route. Once we had a verifiable position on the school we began casting Kentucky Green and Blue Pearl curly tails and had a real good four hours of fishing.
