# Blade Baits For Schooling Bass!

# Bade Baits and Shell Beds ... an unbeatable combination!

Blade baits come in many forms but a personal favorite and the choice of many Kick'n Bass client's is the Steel Shad. Over the past several seasons the Steel Shad has been the #1 selling blade bait in our area and probably yours too. The Steel Shad has the action and look that most mimics the size of the baitfish this time of year plus it's easy to fish. With fall fast approaching bass are chasing shad and

schooling on shell beds at the mouth of the many bays on Kentucky Lake. Bass are notorious for roaming and following schools of baitfish. Look for shell beds in the 10- 13 ft. range near a ledge. This is a great place to start. I especially like these areas if they're located close to the mouths of main lake bays. Using your Lowrance High Definition Electronics to find these likely spots will offer you a better chance at finding bass this time of year. Shell Beds + Shad + Blade Bait = Bass in the boat. Choosing the right size lure and fishing equipment for this type of fishing is easy. The Steel Shad comes in only one size and your favorite spinning combo or bait casting outfit will work; just remember that the rod needs to about 7', can handle the weight of

the lure and has an extra fast tip to get the distance on your cast. The line choice is much more important for a lot of reasons. Since there is a possibility that you could be making extra long casts, you'll want a line that will launch the bait a great distance and doesn't have any line stretch. A combination of a braided main line and a fluorocarbon leader is just what the doctor ordered. The braid and fluorocarbon leader allows one to feel the bait vibrating and, with no line stretch, the hook sets are true. This line set up has proven to be far superior to just mono or fluorocarbon. My personal choice is a 10 lb Power Pro braid and a P-Line 100% 10 lb fluorocarbon leader. The two lines are joined using a double uni-knot. Experience has shown that more fish will be hooked and landed on the braid combo because of the sure hook-sets and lack of line stretch. Catching fish on this bait is not as difficult as you might think. Actually working the lure is pretty simple. There are several ways to use this bait but it's most important that you match the retrieve to the mood of the fish. Two of the most effective methods are




the yoyo retrieve, which works well on aggressive fish, or a slow steady retrieve for those fish that are not so aggressive. Start by casting the lure and let it fall to the bottom. You'll know it's on the bottom when you get some slack in your line. Using the yoyo retrieve you'll want pull the lure off the bottom about a foot ever so gently but still feel the vibration of the lure. Let it fall to the bottom on a semi-tight line. Drop your rod tip, take out the slack and repeat the process all the way back to the boat. A lot of the strikes will come as the bait is falling. The reasoning behind this retrieve is; bass are mauling baitfish and if they don't swallow it head first they have to spit it out to swallow it correctly. Some of the stunned baitfish fall to the bottom and the bass has to go get it. Other times when I feel a strike but no hook up I immediately drop the bait to the bottom and then steadily bring it back to the boat. This mimics a stunned baitfish coming back to life and trying to get out of harms way. On active fish a steady retrieve works well and it's just what it says it is. Make a long cast let the lure drop to the bottom. Then take up the slack, give the lure a little jerk to get it started and reel in at a slow pace, just enough to keep



the bait off the bottom and vibrating. You'll know it when you get a fish on ... the braided line will transmit those strikes and you'll have a better than average chance at landing the fish. Blade Baits are fun, productive and easy to use. Don't be surprised when you catch a mixed bag either. Crappie and White bass love these baits too. (Photo) Day 1 of Eddie & Tom's Big Adventure ... Tom Norvell and my good friend Eddie Caldwell from Danville, Kentucky with some nice early fall bass caught on Steel Shad blade baits.

**B** oat Dock Pattern ... Flip or pitch plastics around boat docks that have spud poles, especially the ones on the main lake that have deeper water. The lake drawdown is positioning baitfish and fry around the docks and bass see this as an easy opportunity. **Topwater ...** Fishing the deeper banks in the bays with topwaters in the early morning hours. With shad being the primary focus we'll look for baitfish flicking on the surface or swirls. If so we'll stick around. If not we'll go to the next bay and check it out. You just have to keep on the move until you find an active area. We've used several different baits but the SPRO McStick has been doing a pretty good number on the bass. Cast the lure and let it rest and then give it a couple of jerks. Table Rock Shad, Cell Mate and Chrome Shad have been the best colors for us. **Grass Bass ...** Several nice fish were caught on frogs where the grass is matted and tube jigs on the edge of



the submerged grass. Most grass is in the bays south of Anderson Creek. The grass pattern has been feast or famine for us. Ledge Pattern ... working the ledges is still a very productive way to fish. Once we've located a school we worked them with Football Jigs, Shakey Heads and Steel Shad Blade Baits. Best baits this week have been a 3/16 oz. PJ's bass extractor jig head and Zman 7" finesse worm fished Shakey Head style and a Trout or Gold Steel Shad Blade Bait. The Shakey Heads were slowly crawled on the bottom amongst the shell beds and at times the best bite came with little or no action. The Steel Shad blade baits were gently lifted off the bottom and dropped on a tight line. (Photo) Day2 of Eddie & Tom's Big Adventure ... Eddie Caldwell with a monster Largemouth caught dragging a 1/2 oz Football Jig.

**White Bass** fishing has been good this week but not without its challenges. With the shad migration the bigger schools are scattering. We had to hunt and peck to find them but by the end of the day we managed to come up with a good catch. The best lures have been the Steel Shad Blade baits in Gold and Silver and Ken's Hybrid Spinners. Ripping the baits off the bottom and let the lure fall on a semi-tight line seemed to work well.

**Crappie** ... We didn't get to fish for crappie much this week but when we did we caught several nice fish in the  $1-1\frac{1}{2}$  pound class. The fish are holding at many depths. The bite is on over submerged cover 8 - 15 feet on minnows and jigs and 15- 25 feet around stumps along the old river channel. Take your pick ... it's all good!

Catfish, Bluegill and Redear ... We didn't fish for these therefore there is No Report

This week we found this hump full of bass and stripes. My clients and I caught a bunch on Steel Shad blade baits before the school got wise and moved on.
