### Lake Conditions

**Lake Levels** ... As of this morning both lakes are very near winter pool. Some gates are spilling at both Barkley & Kentucky creating significant current in the upper lake. For additional info, including generation schedule for Kentucky Lake, visit the TVA website: <u>http://www.tva.gov/lakes/kyh\_r.htm</u>

**Water Clarity and Temperature** ... Kentucky Lake ranges from stained in some of the creeks to the main lake dingy. Barkley is heavily stained in the creeks and bays and the main lake is stained. Surface water temps on both lakes are in the mid 40's. *Always wear your PFD and keep an extra change of clothes on board.* Advise others of your fishing plans.

**Friday**...Partly sunny. A slight chance of drizzle in the morning. Highs around 50. Southwest winds 10 to 15 mph.

### **Fishing Report**


**Crappie** ... Fair to good over submerged cover. Long Line trolling is picking up good numbers of fish this week and if I had to pick between vertically fishing and Long Line Trolling the nod would go to Long Line trolling since there is a ton of fish scattered on the flats. Trolling 1/16 oz jigs in Blue and Chartreuse or Electric Chicken seems to be best. *Tip ... When it's windy use drift socks they work like a charm.* 

Remember all those 9/34 inch crappie you were throwing back last spring ... YEAH BABY! Those fish are now 11-13 inches and are itching to be caught. *If you don't call and book your trip right away you'll miss out!* 

#### Bass Fishing ...

Jerkbaits on the east side and slow rolling medium diving crank baits along the points at the mouths of the bays worked best for us. We caught several nice fish in the 3lb range. The best jerk bait was the SPRO McStick. Umbrella rigs are catching a few suspended fish. Overall bass fishing is like the weather good on some days and slow on others. With the best Feeding Times of the month upon us this should be a very good weekend to fish.

Blade Baits are still catch a good number of fish along the main river channel humps and ledges. The Steel Shad is top dawg for this type of fishing.




# The importance of Fresh Water mussel beds (shell beds) ...

Freshwater Mussels play an important role in our Lakes and Rivers. Mussels, present in large numbers are commonly known around these parts as "shell beds". Mussels transform marine habitat making it suitable for themselves as well as other species. Mussels capture organic matter from the water column and use it to build a body and shell. The waste material from this process creates nutrients that are immediately available to plant life and fish to consume. During this feeding process, the mussels also filter the water they live in. You may have noticed that Kentucky Lake is much clearer now days. A lot of this is the result of an abundant mussel population.

Where mussels exist in large numbers, they form underwater beds that attract algae, which attract minnows, which in turn attract crawfish, which in turn attracts game fish. You get the idea; it's basically the start of a food chain in our lake. An ideal place to find game fish, especially bass, is around "shell beds". Here on KY Lake "Shell Beds" are golden!

# SONAR TIP OF THE WEEK ...



This screen shot was taken during one of our on the water sonar classes. Fresh Water Mussel Beds (Commonly referred as Shell Beds) are a vital part of the ecosystem in our lakes. "Shell Beds" act like a fish magnet. We found this school of bass relating to a mid-bay submerged road bed covered with shells. We marked the area and came back later in the day during the Prime Feeding Time and caught several nice fish. No way would we have found this location without the aid of our Lowrance HDS System. # Kick'n Bass takes on the Conch Republic ...


