Lake Conditions

Lake Levels ... As of this morning both lakes are at summer pool give or take a few inches. For additional info, including generation schedule for Kentucky Lake, visit the TVA website: http://www.tva.gov/lakes/kyh_r.htm

Water Clarity and Temperature ... Kentucky Lake ranges from slightly stained in the back of the bays to the main lake dingy in spots but clearing. Barkley is dingy in the main lake but the bays look just right. Surface water temps are in the 72 degree range with the back of the bays warming to the mid 70's on sunny days.

Weather Outlook

Friday...Mostly cloudy with a 40 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms. Highs in the mid 80s. South winds 10 to 15 mph.

Friday Night...Partly cloudy in the evening then becoming mostly cloudy. A 30 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms. Lows in the lower 70s. South winds 10 to 15 mph.

Saturday...Mostly cloudy with showers and thunderstorms likely. Highs in the lower 80s. South winds 10 to 15 mph. Chance of precipitation 60 percent.

Saturday Night...Showers and thunderstorms. Lows in the upper 60s. Chance of precipitation 80 percent.

Sunday...Partly sunny with a 30 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms. Highs in the upper 70s. **Sunday Night**...Mostly clear. Lows around 60.





The Double <u>Uni-Knot – My Favorite knot to join Braid and a Flurocarbon Leader.</u> Here's a step by step diagram of how to join the lines.



1. Overlap ends of two lines of about the same diameter for about 6".

Take one end, and form the Uni-Knot circle, crossing the two lines about midway of the overlapped distance.




2. Tie the Uni-Knot, making six turns around the two lines (leaving the loop free).



3. Pull the tag end to form a snug knot tight around the line.



4. Tie another Unit-Knot in the opposite direction. Use the loose end of the overlapped line to as shown above and pull snug.



5. Wet the lines and pull the two standing lines in opposite directions to slide the knots together. Pull as tightly as possible and snip ends as close as possible.

Fishing Report



Bass Fishing ... at times it's about as good as it can get. Yes there are some fish on the beds but overall the bass are aggressively feeding and willing to be caught. From the back of the bays to the Ledges and in between fish are being caught. Here's a breakdown of several productive patterns ...

Back Bay Pattern ... schools of fish are feeding on shad and these are primarily 14-15 inch fish with an occasional big female. We caught a lot of fish casting **Steel Shad blade baits**. Best colors on the Steel Shad are Silver on sunny days and Gold on cloudy days. The Steel Shad has just the right profile and action to mimic a baitfish which is what the bass are feeding on. If you want a lot of action this is the way to go but a 3 pounder is considered a good fish

Secondary Points located mid-way in the larger bays are holding

some bigger fish as the bass are working their way back out to offshore ledges and humps. Crankbaits and Steel Shad blade baits are your best bet. We caught several 3-4 pound fish on this pattern. Best points are those that have deeper water within a cast of the bank. Chunk rock banks with coffee can sized rocks seem to be the most productive. **Points at the mouth of the bays** are holding some really good fish. We've done several TV shows lately and we found that the submerged points at the mouth of the bays to have a good number of post-spawn females on them. The better areas were those where current was readily apparent. The best lure for catching these fish has been the PJ's Bass extractor jig and ZMan finesse worm. Best colors are "New Money" in clearing water and sunlight and "Coppertruese" in dingy water and cloud cover.

Ledge Pattern ... This pattern is good and getting better. (See Sonar Tip of the Week Photo) When we've found schools of fish on the main lake ledges 18-22 feet deep they have been cooperative.

However not all ledges have these schools. My observation is that the fish are just beginning to school up in these areas. Ledges along the secondary channels closest to the mouth of the bays are holding more fish at times but these areas are basically transition areas and the fish are there today and gone tomorrow. Best methods have been dragging a Shakey Head or a football jig with a ZMan Flappin Craw along the bottom. Our biggest fish of the week have come from the ledges with clients catching several fish between 6-7 pounds. These are post spawn females.

Boat Dock Pattern ... The boat dock pattern is a much overlooked way to fish right now. Boat docks are holding fish especially the older docks with spud poles. Spud poles are the big metal poles on the corners of the dock that allows the dock to raise up and down with the water levels. There is a lot of fry milling around the docks and baitfish and bluegills are feeding which is attracting the bass. Almost any lure will catch fish providing it is used in a finesse presentation. A ZMan Zinkerz, which is a Senko look alike, fish weightless is a very good technique for this type of fishing. Our biggest fish of the week come

from a main lake dock using this method.



Bluegill & Redear ... Although the mad rush seems to be subsiding we still caught enough Redear to keep things interesting. Best tactic was to cast a **Shelton's Bluegill Bug** tipped with a piece of red worm, wax worm or cricket. Look for gravel banks in the back of the bays with some wood and you'll be in business. Remember, think deeper than bluegill and your catch will improve. By the way the Redear this year have been huge.

White Bass ... The whites are showing up with regularity and we've been catching them on Steel Shad blade baits and Ken's Hybrid spinners. The whites are deep and relating to current on

the main lake and near the mouth of the bays.

Crappie ... Ditto from last week. Basically crappie fishing is being overshadowed by Bass and Redear and Bluegill fishing. We spent a couple of hours this week fishing submerged brush piles and caught a pretty good mess casting 1/8 oz. KY Green curly Tails on a Ken's fine wire lead head. Also I've observed several anglers dressing crappie at the cleaning station so we're not the only ones catching them. The bottom line is Crappie aren't getting as much attention as they deserve with Bass, Redear and Bluegill fishing dominating the news right now.

Sonar Tip of the Week ...



These fish are positioned on a secondary ledge at the mouth of a bay on a shell bed. Note the absence of baitfish. These fish were in a non-feeding mode. Once we figured that out, we drug a Shakey Head thru the school and we finally got them to bite. We caught several nice fish from the school before they got wise and moved on. One of the really neat things about the new Touch screen units is, by adding a HDI Transducer to the trolling motor, it enables the angler to have Downscan at the bow unit and really see what's down there. Using only a regular Sonar unit, it would have been easy to miss the fact that there were no baitfish present and we may have used a more aggressive method to fish thus missing out on a good fishing catching opportunity. Sometimes it's the little things that can make a difference in angling success.
