Bass Fishing ... I know this must sound like a broken record but this has been another tough week for us and when I say that I don't necessarily mean that we didn't catch fish it's just that we had to really work very hard for them and at times it was a long time between bites. No one pattern stood out. We caught some on the ledges on crank baits and soft plastics and some in the back of the creeks and bays on Steel Shad blade baits and lipless crank baits. There is still a ton of shad in the back of the bays and around boat docks! The one bright spot was the TOP WATER BITE ...

Top Water Bite ... This has been great for numbers and pretty good for size. Anytime you can catch bass on top it's a good thing. Best areas are towards the back of the bays and any top water with a prop on the back seems to out produce one without. Our best fish and numbers came on a Tiny Torpedo on Shad color and fished with a slow retrieve and long pause.

Boat Dock Pattern ... this had been a VERY consistent way to catch some pretty good bass for several weeks now but has seemed to wane a bit but none the less we did catch some fish using this technique. Cast a ZMan ZinkerZ *Flick Shake* style and gently shaking the worm around the spud poles can enticed even the most stubborn fish. This technique takes a lot of patience but it works. The spawn fry are now large enough for the bluegill and there is tons of shad around the docks and the bass are making life miserable for all of them. The best docks are ones that have spud poles on the corners and very close to deeper water. Remember this is a finesse presentation.

Ledge Fishing ...

The best ledges for us are near the secondary channel and especially those with wood on them. Zman Shakey Heads and football head jigs dragged on the bottom were the best lures. Best depth was 18-22 feet.

Stripe Bass Fishing ... We've caught a fair amount of fish in the jumps at the mouths of the creeks and bays and on the main lake flats adjoining the Tennessee River Channel. These jumps are fast and furious and sometimes don't last very long but have produced some very nice fish. Remember when the surface action subsides to let the ***Steel Shad blade bait or Ken's Hybrid Spinner*** drop below the feeding school ... you'll be surprised how many you can catch that way. Also stripes are schooling along main lake ledges. We used our Lowrance HDS System to find these schools and when we did we really caught them

Bluegill & Redear ... while we didn't fish for these specifically I did see some pretty nice fish at the cleaning station this week and with the on again off again mayfly hatches no doubt they were caught underneath overhanging tree limbs and around boat docks casting bug baits tipped with a cricket or wax worm.

Blade Baits For Schooling Bass!



Blade Baits and Shell Beds ... an unbeatable combination!

Blade baits come in many forms but a personal favorite and the choice of many Kick'n Bass client's is the Steel Shad. Over the past several seasons the Steel Shad has been the #1 selling blade bait in our area and probably yours too. The Steel Shad has the action and look that most mimics the size of the baitfish this time of year plus it's easy to fish. Bass are chasing shad and schooling on shell beds at the mouth of the many bays on Kentucky Lake. Bass are notorious for roaming and following schools of baitfish. Look for shell beds in the 10- 13 ft. range near a ledge. This is a great place to start. I especially like these areas if they're located close to the mouths of main lake bays. Using your

Lowrance High Definition Electronics to find these likely spots will offer you a better chance at finding bass this time of year. Shell Beds + Shad + Blade Bait = Bass in the boat. Choosing the right size lure and fishing equipment for this type of fishing is easy. The Steel Shad comes in only one size and your favorite spinning combo or bait casting outfit will work; just remember that the rod needs to about 7', can handle the weight of the lure and has an extra fast tip to get the distance on your cast. The line choice is much more important for a lot of reasons. Since there is a possibility that you could be making extra long casts, you'll want a line that will launch the bait a great distance and doesn't have any line stretch. A combination of a braided main line and a fluorocarbon leader is just what the doctor ordered. The braid and fluorocarbon leader allows one to feel the bait vibrating and, with no line stretch, the hook sets are true. This line set up has proven to be far superior to just mono or fluorocarbon. My personal choice is a 10 lb Power Pro braid and a P-Line 100% 10 lb fluorocarbon leader. The two lines are joined using a double uni-knot. Experience has shown that more fish will be hooked and landed on the braid combo because of the sure hook-sets and lack of line stretch. Catching fish on this bait is not as difficult as you might think. Actually working the lure is pretty simple. There are several ways to use this bait but it's most important that you match the retrieve to the mood of the fish. Two of the most effective methods are the yoyo retrieve, which works well on aggressive fish, or a slow steady retrieve for those fish that are not so aggressive. Start by casting the lure and let it fall to the bottom. You'll know it's on the bottom when you get some slack in your line. Using the yoyo retrieve you'll want pull the lure off the bottom about a foot ever so gently but still feel the vibration of the lure. Let it fall to the bottom on a semi-tight line. Drop your rod tip, take out the slack and repeat the process all the way back to the

boat. A lot of the strikes will come as the bait is falling. The reasoning behind this retrieve is; bass are mauling baitfish and if they don't swallow it head first they have to spit it out to swallow it correctly. Some of the stunned baitfish fall to the bottom and the bass has to go get it. Other times when I feel a strike but no hook up I immediately drop the bait to the bottom and then steadily bring it back to the boat. This mimics a stunned baitfish coming back to life and trying to get out of harms way. On active

fish a steady retrieve works well and it's just what it says it is. Make a long cast let the lure drop to the bottom. Then take up the slack, give the lure a little jerk to get it started and reel in at a slow pace, just enough to keep the bait off the bottom and vibrating. You'll know it when you get a fish on ... the braided line will transmit those strikes and you'll have a better than average chance at landing the fish. Blade Baits are fun, productive and easy to use. Don't be surprised when you catch a mixed bag either.
