We caught so many of these brutes that I lost count and many times we doubled up. I have bruises in places only reserved for saltwater fish and my left thumb is blistered from "thumbing" the reel spool when I fought and landed the biggest, baddest freshwater fish I've ever had on a rod & reel. "Silver and Big Head are Excellent Table Fare" These fish are NOT bottom feeders! They eat plankton from the surface and are clean and healthy fish. Since they don't ingest baitfish or other game fish they don't accumulate high levels of mercury like Bass or Catfish. Their meat is delicious, white and flaky and can be fried, baked, grilled, etc. Many fine retaurants in New Orleans now offer this dish on their menus.

**Lake Levels ...** Both lakes are about 2.75 feet below summer pool and on a slow drawdown. For additional info, including generation schedule for Kentucky Lake, visit the TVA website: http://www.tva.gov/lakes/kyh r.htm

**Water Clarity and Temperature ...** The water clarity in both lakes is ideal for fishing. Some areas are clearer than others but overall water quality is looking real good. Surface water temp is 80-84 degrees depending on where you're fishing.

# \*\*\* Fishing Report \*\*\*

#### Bass Fishing ...

I hate to sound like a broken record but not much has changed since last week with the exception of the Ledge Bite which is on an upswing.

**Shallow Water Pattern** ... Some of the best action this week has come from the back of the bays. Baitfish are roaming in huge schools this time of year and if you can see the clouds of baitfish just under



the surface make a cast in their direction. Bass like to stalk their prey. One thing we did this week was to cast several different baits until we determined what the bass liked best. One client would cast a Steel Shad blade bait, Silver on clear days and Gold on cloudy. Another client would cast a SPRO ArukuShad75 in shad pattern. Something we noticed is the Yellows and White bass would hit the blade bait as well as the bass but the SPRO seemed to catch mostly bass with an occasional stripe. We determined that the bass would home in on the rattle. (Photo) Eric Foister with another good one.

**Boat Dock Pattern** ... Boat docks are a safe bet to get bit. The spawn fry are now large enough and there is tons of shad around the docks and the bass are feeding. The best docks are ones that have spud poles on the corners and very close to deeper water. Cast a curly tail on a lead head for best results with Ken's Blue Pearl being the best color.

**Ledge Fishing ...** This pattern is definitely improving and we've caught some pretty good fish at times using a 1, 2, 3 punch of a Crankbait, Steel Shad blade bait and a Shakey Head or jig. Zman Shakey Heads and football head jigs dragged on the bottom were the best lures. Best depth was 10-15 feet on the break.

**Stripe Bass Fishing ...** We've caught a fair amount of fish in the jumps at the mouths of the creeks and bays and on the main lake flats adjoining the Tennessee River Channel. These jumps are fast and furious and sometimes don't last very long but have produced some very nice fish. Remember when the surface action subsides to let the **Steel Shad blade bait or Ken's Hybrid Spinner** drop below the feeding school ... you'll be surprised how many you can catch that way. Also stripes are schooling along main lake ledges. We used our Lowrance HDS System to find these schools and when we did we really caught them

**Catfish** ... We didn't fish specifically for cats this week but we did catch more than we should have. Every day we were out we caught several on Steel Shad blade baits when we were fishing for bass. I can't imagine what it would be like it we concentrated our efforts on just cat fishing.
